## Nursing Students Receive Scholarship From the Dallas County Medical Society Alliance Foundation

Seven nursing students were awarded Edith Cavell scholarships totaling \$8,500 from the Dallas County Medical Society Alliance Foundation in October. Six of the students attend TWU: Shana Hansford, Whitney Hain, Grace Park, Soo Min Park, Michaela Cortex and Angelica Garcia. Sarah Wilcox attends Baylor.

Recipients are selected based on criteria indicative of the qualities and characteristics necessary to become a successful nurse. Applicants must be currently enrolled in, or accepted to, a nursing school within Dallas County and have a minimum GPA of 3.0. Along with the application, an essay is required and proof of financial need. In addition to the financial support, recipients benefit from the networking opportunities available to them through DCMSAF and are mentored by members of the Edith Cavell board.

One of the primary missions of DCMSAF is to promote health education through community programming. The Edith Cavell Nursing Scholarship Fund was established in 1954 in honor of **Edith Cavell**, the first woman killed by Nazi firing squad during World War II. Her crime was aiding the escape of over 300 Allied soldiers while simultaneously caring for all the wounded in her charge as a Red Cross volunteer nurse. Since its inception, more than \$500,000 has been awarded to 1,359 nursing scholars.

Edith Cavell Scholarship Fund Chair is **Rachal Nettune**. Board members are **Cheri Whitten**, **Dianne Moy**, **Sandy DeBusk**, and ex-officio members **Lori Routh** and **Barenda Hino**.

#### **New Historical Marker Awarded!**

DCMSAF began 2016 with news of a second historical marker at Aldredge House commemorating our history. Elizabeth Gunby submitted a new marker application in November to the Texas Historical Commission. Mrs. John O. McReynolds, our first president, spearheaded events that changed not only the course of local and state history, but also the course of national history. All other county, state, and national organizations evolved from our organization founded in 1917 in Dallas County. Fred Durham, County Historical Commission chair, reported that our application had been approved by the Texas Historical Commission. The TMAA and AMAA has been notified about this news. Mr. Durham remarked, "It is very significant that the DCMSA is the oldest medical Alliance in the country. I am planning to be right there with you to celebrate!"

#### F.A.R.M. Program

At the January General Meeting, we turned our attention to learning about a reintegration program for returning combat veterans and a successful program that helps those suffering with PTSD. The F.A.R.M.-Farmers Assisting Returning Military program about gardening therapy was enlightening and inspirational. F.A.R.M. has acquired a property just south of the Dallas Farmers Market and will build an urban educational farm and garden. They will sell fresh produce to local chefs and at the Farmers Market. With the Parks Board Approval and a United Way grant of \$160,000 for a hydroponics tomato house, the Veteran farmers plan to break ground in March. They presented their plans for a composting area, container gardens of all types, raised beds, wicking beds, small pot intensive farming (SPIN), fruit and nut tree planting, permaculture gardens, rooftop gardens, and vertical gardens. #### History of National Doctors' Day

National Doctors' Day is held every year on March 30th in the United States to celebrate the contribution of physicians who serve our country by caring for its' citizens. The first Doctor's Day observance was March 30, 1933 in Winder, Georgia. Eudora Brown Almond, wife of Dr. Charles B. Almond, decided to set aside a day to honor physicians. This first observance included the mailing greeting cards and placing flowers on graves of deceased doctors. The red carnation is commonly used as the symbolic flower for National Doctor's Day.

On March 30, 1958, a Resolution Commemorating Doctors' Day was adopted by the United States House of Representatives. In 1990 President George Bush signed S.J. RES. #366 designating March 30th as "National Doctor's Day. Please honor your favorite doctor's.

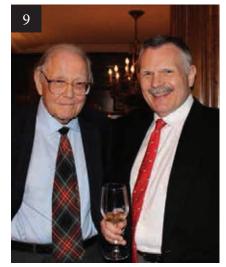

donations to our in-house philanthropies-Aldredge House, Edith Cavell and Benefactors Endowment Fund. TMAA software only allows us to list a fixed dollar amount for each. The Board approved the following amounts for the invoice: \$100 for Aldredge House, \$50 for Edith Cavell Nursing Scholarship Fund and \$50 for Benefactors Endowment Fund. Please remember that not only are donations voluntary, so are the amounts listed. You may give ANY dollar amount, at any time of the year, on our website, dcmsaf.org.

What else is different this year? Modest increases in state and local dues were necessary. The Board approved a \$5 increase, making local membership dues \$50. (in comparison, Tarrant County is \$60 and Harris County is \$45) TMAA's dues increased by \$10, making state dues \$50. State and local dues for widows, residents and medical students are unchanged from last year. Another change took place at the national level. Effective January 2016, AMAA dues will bill their members directly. This means you will no longer see your AMAA dues on your state/local bill. #### **Aldredge House Zoning Update**

Tremendous thanks to everyone who has attended the various public hearings in support of the Aldredge House! The process is ongoing.

As you know, a group of neighbors filed an application with the Dallas Board of Adjustment last summer in order to force us to discontinue our use of the Aldredge House. In an Oct 21 hearing at Dallas City Hall, we successfully defended against the neighbors' efforts to shut us down. In a 4-1 vote, the Board of Adjustment found that our continued use would not have an adverse effect on nearby properties. Unfortunately, this decision doesn't prevent the neighbors from refiling against us at any time. Also, the neighbors have appealed the ruling, although that appeal is on hold until the resolution of our PD application.

In late summer, we filed our own application with the City to create a new PD (Planned Development), a type of sub-district within the Swiss Avenue Historic District. We hoped it would be a win-win for the neighborhood. The PD process allows for neighborhood input on restrictions for our use of the property, over and above current city ordinances. If successful, the Aldredge House would have legally enforceable restrictions to ensure our accountability within the neighborhood.

On Sept 23, the Designation Committee recommended approval of the new sub-district, then, in an Oct 5 hearing, the Landmark Commission approved our application. We've come a long way, but we have further to go. The next step is a hearing before the Plan Commission sometime this spring. We will keep you up to date!
